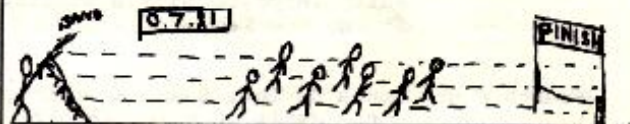

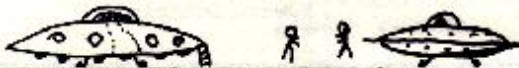


THE EGG TREE
