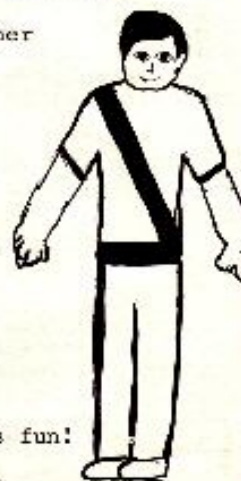

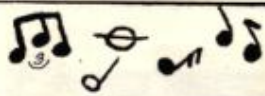


ACCOMPANISTS

Before a performance, these girls get very nervous and worry about all sorts of things. After a performance they realize that it was for nothing, because they do a great job.

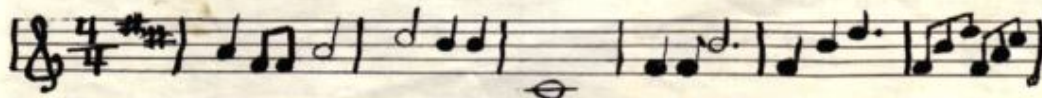

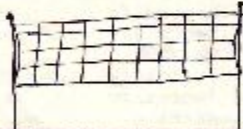

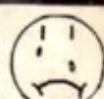
