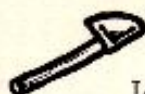


THE EXTINCTION OF BIRDS

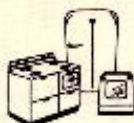
LUNCHROOM DILEMMA

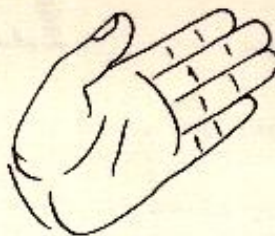

Congratulations are in order for the 91 kindergartners who will be promoted to the first grade.

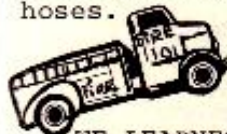

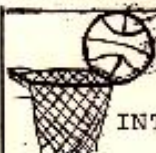
